### **Pastoral Reflection**

Do you remember three years ago, at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, when there was all kinds of conversations about wanting to delay Easter until we could all be in person in our sanctuaries again?

As I sit down to write this article there is a part of me that can relate to wanting to do that this year. I don't feel very triumphant. Or celebratory. Or ready to sing a grand and glorious Hallelujah. I feel very much in the midst of Good Friday. Everywhere I look there it is: sin. Separation. Brokenness. In the world and in the mirror. I don't know if you read the UCC still speaking devotional but I particularly appreciated <u>Quinn Caldwall's devotional on Wednesday</u> in reflecting on the person of Judas. I encourage you to read it if you haven't. At one point he writes, "...few of us make active decisions to try to destroy God; most of us are working hard



on improving. Still we're all trapped in these webs of betrayal...Being alive in a sin-sick world means being infected ourselves."

Indeed. In the last four months I have had many a sleepless night with my heart aching for what has transpired in our conference, grieved by the pain that has been caused and afraid, yet determined, to face my own complicity in it. It is an understatement to say this work of dismantling racism is messy. It is a maelstrom. Though we may have a well-intentioned desire to do what it is right it doesn't mean we are skilled enough to get it right. And there is no way to avoid the fact that in our failures, which will be many, harm is caused. That for me, is the pain of Good Friday.

And yet sitting right next to the part of me that wants to delay Easter there is another part of me that wonders, as I did three years ago, if Easter is actually coming right on time... Exactly when its needed the most.

In the gospel of John we read, "Mary came to the tomb while it was still dark." ... the author of the gospel of John mentions the tomb 9 times in 12 verses. The tomb, the place of endings, the place of ruin, the place of death.

Mary came to the tomb while it was still dark... while many of the disciples were hiding in fear, while her own tears were still wet on her face, while the confusion, and pain, and betrayal and grief still hung in the air.

I often think of Easter as a day that is bright with flowers and grand alleluias but the first Easter at least, was experienced at the tomb, in the place where death and fear and betrayal and judgment and uncertainty and deception and shame and othering and despair and all other manner of human foibles had attempted to confine and constrain the very life that God came to give each one of us and the whole of us together.

When Mary came to the tomb and saw that the body was gone, her grief turned to panic. Her tears became laced with distress. "Sir if you have carried him away tell me where you have laid him and I will take him away!"

And then one word. Mary. Jesus calls her by name. And the place of endings and ruin and death was no longer the end of the story. It doesn't end on Good Friday. There at the tomb she is met by a love more powerful than Mary could ever have imagined. She runs and tells the others "I have seen the Lord!"

I don't know how or even if we are going to find a way from Good Friday to Easter, I do know that if there is a way through it will not be because of our own doing but because God will meet us in this place of ruin. That is the promise of Easter. God meets us in our tombs and is with us as we walk towards new beginnings. Easter doesn't solve everything or say it is all fixed, but it does tell us that God can do something with all the pain, separation and sin that we humans find ourselves in. It is my fervent hope that our encounter with the Risen Christ in the Rocky Mountain Conference will be such that we will one day find ourselves running to proclaim "I too have seen the Lord!"

Until that day comes, I ask God daily for the courage to stay in the discomfort of Good Friday and all our human frailties' and to not rush to an Easter of my own making.


An online session will be held on June 7th from 6pm - 7:30pm CT.

CWS Period Packs (Menstrual Hygiene Kits) Service Project at General Synod 34

In the United States, some people cannot afford menstrual hygiene products such as pads, tampons, and other items that promote healthy practices. This inability to purchase hygiene products is known as period poverty, affecting over 22 million individuals. Church World Service (CWS), a UCC global partner, introduced a Period Pack (Menstrual Hygiene Kit) to help individuals living in period poverty. The kit provides several products that promote cleanliness and health during a menstrual cycle.

Delegates and guests to General Synod are invited to participate in assembling 1,000 CWS Period Packs (Menstrual Hygiene Kits) as a service project. To help with purchasing supplies for this <u>service project</u>, we are requesting your generous <u>financial donations</u>. General Synod delegates and guests can also bring already assembled kits to Synod to drop off in the collection bins that will be available.

If you are not attending General Synod, you may participate by assembling kits at your church using these easy <u>instructions</u>. To assist your efforts, you can apply for a \$250 UCC kits matching grant.
