Pastoral Reflection: Marble Jar Friends

In her book, *Daring Greatly*, Brene Brown talks about "marble jar friends". She tells the story of when her daughter, Ellen, came home from school and burst into tears because a friend had betrayed a confidence that then resulted in the other girls laughing at her. When they got back to their classroom, they were still laughing, so hard that the teacher took marbles out of the class Marble Jar. The teacher kept a jar and a bag of marbles on her desk. Whenever the class was collectively making good decisions, the teacher would put a marble in the jar. Whenever the class was not listening or acting out, she would take a marble out of the jar.



Brene used the jar to help Ellen think about friendship as a marble jar. When someone supports you or demonstrates you can trust them, a marble goes in the jar. If they are mean or disrespectful, marbles come out. Ellen brightened and said, "I have marble jar friends!"

A relationship where the marble jar is filled is a relationship that can confront difficult circumstances and difficult conversations, and both stand up against those tensions and help us grow in new ways with each other and as individuals. Brene asked Ellen about her marble jar friends.

To be a marble jar friend does not require that you agree on everything or that there is an expectation that you are always nice to one another. Foundational to being a marble jar friend is respect and a willingness to build mutual and deep relationships with the other person. The kind of trust that comes with a marble jar friend is the kind of trust that can withstand a whole lot and help us come out stronger together on the other side. It can hold up in the face of difficult conversations, trusting that there is enough respect and love for one another that we can disagree without hurting one another; we can lean into discomfort—our own and the discomfort of another—without walking away; we trust that despite conflict, there is a bigger picture that keeps us talking even when we are tempted to shut down and pull back.

I believe that marble jar friends is what the Bible is talking about in these scripture passages:

- Friends love each other the same way Christ loves us. (John 15:12-13)
- Friends challenge each other to meet the highest good. (Proverbs 27:17)
- Friends never withhold kindness and mercy. (Job 6:14)

Annual Celebration is just over a month away. As we prepare to meet in person and online for this once-a-year-opportunity for Christ's family to come together to share, laugh, be angry, and even cry, I am reminded of how important it is to focus on our marble jar relationships. We may not be in each others' lives on a daily basis to build the kinds of friendships that Ellen has built with her friends, but we are in a relationship of another kind—we are united by Christ as siblings in the communities of faith that make up the Rocky Mountain Conference. Our covenant binds us together in marble jar relationships.

We are going to disagree. We are going to feel deep and important emotions. We are going to struggle with what we want to say and what we are afraid to say. We are going to feel and do all of that and more. We are humans. We are people of faith. We are God's people gathering together because we care about this critical and important work of ministry that we have all committed to.

When we tend to the marble jar, we can disagree in a way that honors our relationships and our commitment. We build trust with one another so disagreement is not something we have to tolerate or try to resolve as quickly as possible in order to avoid discomfort. Instead, disagreement becomes an invitation to look critically at the work before us, our systems and structures and policies, and the changes that we need to make to grown in the call God has put before us.

We can do that because we trust one another to listen just as we promise to listen to others. We can participate in conversations without pulling away or becoming disengaged because we know our common beliefs and values will remain in place and offer support to our work, no matter how difficult.

We don't have to dig our heels in because we are not afraid that what is so important to us is not understood or appreciated by others. We instead trust that as deeply as we care about a situation, the person across from us cares just as deeply. Because we have promised to listen to understand and honor one another's good intentions, we can disagree without being divided. All of this allows us to use our marble jar community to tackle any issue that is before us in a way that brings understanding and commitment to our sacred work *together*.
