OUR MISSION








FOOD INSECURITY IN NW AURORA



Data collected at the 2023 Food Justice Festival in NW Aurora. Responses include Aurora zip codes and zip codes adjacent to NW Aurora.





"...the term 'food apartheid' is used to highlight the racially discriminatory political structures that past and present impact food access and control."


"Food apartheid", on the other hand, communicates that the geographic distribution of increased barriers to food access can be explained not by a community's lack of initiative, but by the continued legacy of racially discriminatory economic and political structures."

"Food Justice is a holistic and structural view of our food systems that sees healthy food as a basic human right and addresses the structural barriers that obstruct this right. These structural barriers include poverty, racial inequity, and social injustice."

FOOD SOVEREIGNTY

"Food sovereignty is the right of all people, communities and countries to define agricultural, food and land policies that are ecologically, socially, economically and culturally relevant. Food sovereignty holds that all people have the right to safe, nutritious and culturally appropriate food and food-producing resources."

SIX PILLARS OF FOOD SOVEREIGNTY

"Food sovereignty is the right of peoples to healthy and culturally appropriate food produced through ecologically sound and sustainable methods, and their right to define their own food and agriculture systems."

FROM CHARITY TO SOLIDARITY

CONSIDERATIONS:

- Customize your initiatives/activities to your community
- Involve those most impacted by injustices in decision making
- Build partnerships local farmers and organizations
- Learn about how food is connected to issues you care about (and remember that food intersects with many other issues - housing, labor, immigration, health care)

Involve those most impacted by food injustices in planning, decision making, and evaluation

- Collaborating with pantry clients to form an advisory body for the pantry
- Design and evaluate new projects and activities based on greatest needs and aspirations of your congregation and neighborhood
 - Soul Food Project Advisory Council

Support local food systems

- Establish partnerships with local farmers, gleaning organizations, food rescue organizations, etc.
- Organizing volunteering with local organizations and farms
- Focus on supporting BIPOC-led organizations and efforts

Invest in local farmers and food businesses

- Church procurement from local farmers and caterers
- Serve as a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) pickup site
- Circulate your financial resources within your community

Utilize church infrastructure, like land, kitchens, and buildings, for food production and food businesses

- Utilize surplus land to host a community garden, urban farm, and/or food forest
 - Work with local nonprofits/community-based organizations to use or lease land for food justice initiatives
 - It Takes A VIllage Community Farm is a 3-acre farm led by Just Roots in partnership with and on the land of Grace United Church of Christ

Utilize church infrastructure, like land, kitchens, and buildings, for food production and food businesses

- Use church kitchen for food justice and economic development activities
 - Congregate meals
 - Food preparation literacy and food preservation
 - Rent commercial kitchen to microenterprises
 - <u>6 Factors to Consider When Renting Out Your Church</u>

Advocate for local, state, and national policies that expand food access, address root causes of food insecurity, defend workers' rights, and create equitable opportunities


